### New Faculty

**ADAM B. BADAWI** [Fall 2010: Contract Law Theory Seminar; Spring 2011: Corporations]

Professor Badawi writes in the areas of contracts and commercial law with a focus on empirical research. He joins the faculty from the University of Chicago Law School where he was a Bigelow Fellow and Lecturer in Law. Badawi practiced as a litigator in the San Francisco office of Munger, Tolles & Olson after clerking for the Hon. Michael W. McConnell of the U. S. Court of Appeals for the Tenth Circuit. He holds BA, JD, and PhD degrees from the University of California at Berkeley, where he graduated from law school Order of the Coif and was a member of the *California Law Review*.

**KEVIN E. COLLINS** [Fall 2010: Survey of Intellectual Property; Spring 2011: Advanced Patent Law, and IP Colloquium Seminar]

Kevin Emerson Collins is a highly respected teacher and scholar in the field of intellectual property, with a particular focus on patent law. His work brings important interdisciplinary insights to bear on such questions as the scope of patentable subject matter and the reach of patent protection into later-developed technologies. Collins received his J.D. in 2002 from Stanford Law School, where he was elected Order of the Coif and served as an articles editor of the Stanford Law Review. He earned his B.A. with a double major in architecture and molecular biophysics and biochemistry in 1990 from Yale College, and his M.Arch. in 1995 from the Columbia University Graduate School of Architecture, Planning and Preservation. Before attending law school, he was a project architect at Bernard Tschumi Architects in New York, N.Y. and Paris, France, as well as an adjunct professor of architecture at Columbia. Collins clerked for now Supreme Court Justice Sonia Sotomayor, when she was serving on the Second Circuit Court of Appeals in New York, N.Y., and for Judge Raymond C. Clevenger of the Federal Circuit Court of Appeals in Washington, D.C. He was an associate professor at Indiana University Maurer School of Law in Bloomington, Indiana prior to joining the Washington University law faculty. He also has served as a visiting professor at the Benjamin N. Cardozo School of Law in New York.

**PEGGIE R. SMITH** [Fall 2010: Contracts, Employment Law]

Professor Smith joins the faculty from the University of Iowa College of Law where she was the Murray Family Professor of Law. Professor Smith's primary teaching and research interests are in the areas of employment and labor law, legal history, and women and work. Her research addresses the legal implications caused by the separation between race and gender, home and work, and work and family. Her recent work has focused on innovative legal strategies to organize and represent low-wage service workers, especially home-based workers performing care work including domestic service, family child care and home care. She is the author of *Principles of Employment Law* (with Rafael Gely, Ann Hodges and Susan Stabile). Previously she taught at the Chicago-Kent College of Law, Illinois Institute of Technology. She received her bachelor's and master's degrees from Yale University, and has started her Ph.D. work in American Studies. She is a 1993 graduate of Harvard Law School where she was Editor in Chief of the Harvard Journal of Law & Gender (formerly the Harvard Women's Law Journal). Prior to entering law teaching, Professor Smith clerked for the Honorable Michael Boudin of the U.S. Court of Appeals for the First Circuit, before returning to Harvard as a Charles Hamilton Houston Fellow in Law Teaching. Professor Smith serves on the editorial Board of the Employee Rights and Employment Policy Journal. She is also a member of the Labor Law Group, a national collective of law professors dedicated to advancing pedagogy and scholarship on labor and employment law.

**JORGE CONTRERAS** [Fall 2010: IP for Business Organizations, Law & Regulation of Science; Spring 2011: Internet Law Seminar]

Jorge Contreras practiced law at Wilmer Cutler Pickering Hale and Dorr (former Hale and Dorr) for seventeen years, advising a broad range of institutions and business enterprises on transactional and intellectual property matters. His practice encompassed technology-related issues such as research and development, technical standardization, e-commerce, open source software, outsourcing and technology licensing, as well as transactions involving literary, artistic and musical works. Professor Contreras serves on the Council of the National Human Genome Research Institute at NIH and is Chair of the Committee on Technical Standardization of the ABA Section of Science & Technology Law. He edited the ABA's 2007 Standards Development Patent Policy Manual, and has published numerous articles relating to standards and technology law. He is a graduate of Harvard Law School, with undergraduate degrees in English and electrical engineering from Rice University. He clerked for Chief Justice Thomas R. **Russell Osgood** [Spring 2011: Constitutional Law]

Russell K. Osgood, the immediate past president of Grinnell College and former dean of Cornell Law School, will serve as a visiting lecturer in spring 2011. He is the author of multiple articles, and his books include *Cases and Materials on Employee Benefits* (with Peter Wiedenbeck), *The Law in Massachusetts: The Supreme Judicial Court 1692-1992*, and *The Law of Pensions and Profit-Sharing: Qualified Retirement Plans and Other Deferred Compensation Arrangements*. Osgood is an expert on American legal history, employee benefits and pension law, and income taxation. Osgood served as president of Grinnell College from July 1998 to July 2010, where he also was a professor of history and political science. A 1969 graduate of Yale College and a 1974 graduate of Yale Law School, he served in the U.S. Navy and worked as a lawyer specializing in employee benefits. Osgood was a member of the law faculty at both Boston University and Cornell University, where he served as the Allen R. Tessler Dean of the law school from 1988 to 1998. At Washington University, he will teach Constitutional Law I.

### **New Adjunct Faculty**

**NINA BALSAM** [Spring 2011: Domestic Violence and the Law]

Nina Balsam has extensive background and training in domestic violence law, including working at Legal Services of Eastern Missouri, the Missouri Coalition Against Domestic Violence, and the Center for Women in Transition. Her experience also includes being the Co-chair of the Board of Missouri Restorative Justice Coalition; the Founder, Member, and Chair of Board for Community Conflict Services, Inc., a community justice center; a member of the U.S. Representative Richard Gephardt's Domestic Violence Task force; chair and member of Missouri Bar Committee of 22<sup>nd</sup> Judicial Circuit Lawyer Discipline Committee; an Investigator for Missouri Bar Committee of 22<sup>nd</sup> Judicial Circuit; and Founder and Chair of Adult Abuse Committee of the Young Lawyers Section of BAMSLS (where she designed and directed *Pro bono* Project to represent abuse victims seeking Orders of Protection and designed and delivered professional training seminars on the Adult Abuse Law); and she was on the Board of Directors of National Center on Women and Family Law. She has also taught as an adjunct at Fontbonne, Lindenwood and Webster University. Professor Balsam earned her J.D. at Washington University School

of Law, her M.S. in Human Service Agency Management at Lindenwood University, and her B.A. in Government/Economics, at Simmons College in Boston, MA. Professor Balsam has received numerous awards over the years, including: Distinguished Service Award from University of Central Missouri for work promoting restorative justice; W. Oliver Rausch Award for Outstanding Journal Article from Missouri Bar Foundation; Heartland Mediators' President's Award for Missouri Restorative Justice Initiative; Sunshine Peace Award, a national award honoring domestic violence advocates; first recipient of Nina Balsam Meritorious Service Award from St. Louis Metropolitan Region; Missouri Coalition Against Domestic Violence; Outstanding Service Award from Legal Services of Eastern Missouri for work on the Missouri Adult Abuse Act; founding Mother Award from St. Louis Abused Women's Support Project; and the Community Service Award from the St. Louis Abused Women's Support Project.

**JANET L. BOLIN** [Spring 2011: Mediation Theory & Practice]

Janet Bolin is the Associate Dean of Admissions and Student Services at Washington University School of Law. Dean Bolin has mediated over 200 cases, and mediated neglect and abuse cases for the Juvenile Court of Cook County, juvenile disturbances cases for the Chicago Transit Authority, and employment discrimination cases for the State of Illinois Department of Human Rights. She was trained by the Center for Conflict Resolution (<http://www.ccrchicago.org/>, originally called the Neighborhood Justice Center of Chicago). Her experience as a mediator includes mediating cases for class, and then as a volunteer for the organization, from 1988 to 1994. At the CCR, she was involved in training and reviewing mediation volunteers and served as Chair of the Peer Review Board, 1993 to 1994. In the late 1990s, Janet participated in a training program for family and divorce mediation, taught by Robert Benjamin (JD/MSW). More recently, she provided instruction on the mediation process for school teachers and administrators, Grades 6 -12 through an organization called CHARACTER<sup>plus</sup> at a local workshop and then again, at their annual 2009 conference meeting. Before coming to Washington University in 1994, she was Assistant Dean of Career Services at De Paul University College of Law. Dean Bolin currently services on the Governance Board and Board of Trustees for the Law School Admission Council. She earned her J.D. from De Paul University College of Law, where she was the Articles Editor for the *Journal of Health and Hospital Law*.

**J. BENNETT CLARK** [Spring 2011: Trademark Practice]

Ben Clark is a partner at Bryan Cave. He has been responsible for business litigation in courts throughout the United States for over 25 years. Since 1991, the bulk of his practice has been directed to first-chairing intellectual property lawsuits in the areas of patent, trademark, trade secret, domain name, software, copyright and antitrust. He remains active in white collar criminal defense and has conducted several internal corporate investigations. **PETER A. GIANINO** [Spring 2011: Representation of U.S. Citizens in Immigration Court Proceedings]

Eileen A. Kamerick was recently named Chief Financial Officer and Managing Director of Houlihan Lokey, a leading international investment bank and financial advisory firm. Houlihan Lokey was named the leading M&A firm and financial restructuring firm for 2009 by Thomson Reuters. The firm has 14 offices across the US, Asia, and Europe. Professor Kamerick brings 25 years of senior level financial and legal experience to the role. Prior to her appointment to this senior role at Houlihan Lokey, Ms. Kamerick served as Senior Vice President, Chief Financial Officer and Chief Legal Officer for TectaAmerica Corporation. Tecta is the country's largest commercial roofing company with particular expertise in the area of environmental services, including green roofs and solar roofing installations. Tecta is majority owned by KRG Capital. In her role, Professor Kamerick was responsible for financial reporting, capital structure, mergers and acquisitions, legal and regulatory affairs, taxes, treasury, and information technology. Previously, Professor Kamerick served as Executive Vice President, Chief Financial Officer, and Chief Administrative Officer for Heidrick & Struggles International, Inc. (NASDAQ: HSII). Heidrick & Struggles is the world's leading international executive search and leadership development firm. She joined the company from her position as executive vice president and chief financial officer of Bcom3, parent company of Leo Burnett and Starcom Media, following the successful sale of Bcom3 to Publicis, SA. Professor Kamerick has served as a senior legal and financial executive for several Fortune 500 companies. Among these positions, she was Vice President and Chief Financial officer, BP Amoco Americas, following the merger of British Petroleum, p.l.c. and Amoco. In that role, she was responsible for the management and integration of the US financial functions for BP, Amoco, and ARCO with a total asset value of over \$100 billion. Prior to the merger, Professor Kamerick served as Vice President and Treasurer of Amoco Corporation, Fortune 20 oil, gas and petrochemical company. In that role, she oversaw many significant capital projects, including the acquisition and financing of Amoco's fleet of international and coastwise crude oil and refined petroleum product tankers. Professor Kamerick led many significant international transactions during her tenure at Amoco, including joint ventures and financings in Asia, Europe, Africa, and South America. As Vice President and Treasurer, she had responsibility for the company's pension assets (\$16 billion) and served on the pension investment committee.
